To the members of the Albany Arts Committee -

We all would like to beautify our town and I would venture to say that we all would like to reduce our Greenhouse Gas Emissions, as per Albany's Climate Action Plan. Wouldn't it be nice if we could accomplish both of those things simultaneously?

Albany Strollers & Rollers is the volunteer-based citizens' group (almost 400 member households) dedicated to service and advocacy for pedestrians and cyclists. Some of the services we have performed are providing free Bicycle Valet Parking and Bike Tune-ups at the Arts & Green Festival, providing free Bicycle Valet Parking at the Solano Stroll, installing almost 1000 free lights on the bikes of Albany students, working with elementary school students on bicycle safety at Cycling Clinics and the APAL Bike Rodeos, and partnering with the Albany Community Foundation to fund new racks at Memorial and Terrace Parks.

A lack of secure bike parking is a major reason why some people choose not to ride to do their errands, and get into their cars instead. Therefore, in order to encourage people to ride their bicycles in our 1.7 square mile city, AS&R has decided use some of the money we have raised to partially fund additional racks for businesses. By "partially fund," I mean that we would put some money into it and the business would put some money into it. That should net us more racks in town than if AS&R were fully funding racks. City Staff know that we need more secure bike parking and has agreed to install, at no charge, any racks that AS&R and local businesses fund.

The two racks we want to offer are basic Inverted U racks (like those at the library and parks) and the Dero "Bike Bike Rack" shown here:

I wanted to give businesses the option of spending a bit more money to get a more aesthetically pleasing and artistic rack (each rack can hold up to 4 bikes.) I think these would look fantastic on Solano and San Pablo. You may have seen them in Oakland, Emeryville and San Rafael. Coincidentally, Arts Committee member Peggy McQuaid saw them on her recent trip to Minneapolis.

They look so attractive and really add to the streetscape!

Here are some photos of them in action:





The Bike Bike Rack is a lot more attractive than a dark green U or wave rack. It announces what it is and is aesthetically pleasing even when not in use. City Staff is very excited about the prospect of Bike Bike Racks in Albany.

The Director of the Albany Chamber of Commerce, an organization that AS&R belongs to, is also looking forward to having artistic racks in our town, and will send a notice about our Bike Rack Program to its member businesses through its e-newsletter. I have made preliminary contact with a member of the Planning & Zoning Commission, who agrees that these "sculptural" multicolored racks would liven up our business district.

An Inverted U rack costs \$150. AS&R will give \$75 toward that cost, the business paying the rest. **AS&R would like to be able to pitch the Bike Bike Racks to businesses as a practical and attractive alternative**. They are pricier than the U racks but much more beautiful. The Bike Bike Racks' cost will depend upon the number of racks ordered, because the shipping costs won't rise as much when there are more in the shipment. For instance, 1 = @ \$641.39; 2 = \$1,075.78, @ \$537.89 and the prices go down a bit per rack as more are ordered. AS&R will contribute \$200 for any Bike Bike Rack and ask the business to contribute. Monies in the Public Art Fund that have been aggregated from various development projects can be allocated at the discretion of the Albany Arts Committee. We were hoping that the Arts Committee could agree to make a contribution toward these artistic bike racks, in order to encourage people to select the more attractive racks. As per the City's Arts Master Plan, adopted in 2010, this would fit perfectly with Albany's commitment to art and design elements in the public domain (i.e., accessible in or visible from public space.)

We hope you agree that the Bike Racks would not only be practical for Albany's residents and businesses, but also enhance the Albany streetscape. As you can see, many of the pieces of this puzzle are in place and the Arts Committee can be a vital part of this program.

As with the Arts & Green Festival, here is a great opportunity for us to celebrate Albany as a green city that values the arts.




