Albany has more than just a "sense" of community. How did this come to be?
A recent news story caught my eye - it featured a number of activities that helped to build community, including:

Voting Knowing Your Neighbors Volunteering

Voting: Every November of even-numbered years, Albany voters shape the direction of the City by casting ballots for elected leaders and voting on local measures that affect the city's rules, policies, and funding. The City's five City Council Members are each elected to four-year terms; these terms are staggered so that there is an election every two years.

This year there are three City Council seats up for election; two of the three are held by Council Members who have served two consecutive terms and are not eligible to run for re-election. The City's other elected position — City Treasurer — is also voted on every four years, and is on this year's ballot.

As a charter city, you may see more ballot measures than you would in "general law" cities. This year the City has one ballot measure.

Knowing Your Neighbors: In a city of 1.7 square miles, even someone across town can be your neighbor!
Neighbors can be found at City events - Dinner with Albany, Music in the Park, Clothing/Garden Swaps, July 4th, Pancake Breakfasts, National Night Out, Safety Palooza, Albany Citizens Academy, etc. Or through social media - NextDoor, and Around Your Block, or by walking, biking, and

saying hello.

Volunteering We have a stake in what we help make. Albany is full of educated folks with big hearts and loads of talent volunteering to create community. City volunteers - like Tennessee Gock and Helen Cameron help with Albany special events. Volunteer Police Reserves add to our public safety. Other volunteers plant trees, weed, help with office tasks, and beautify the city. Appointees to the City's commissions, committees, and boards analyze, and advise on topics ranging from dogs to development.

A Three-fer: the upcoming grant-funded San Pablo Avenue "Complete Streets" planning process provides for voting, knowing your neighbors and volunteering to all come together: join us in planning for a more "livable" San Pablo Avenue.

Help Build Complete Streets

How can we improve the safety of Buchanan Street and San Pablo Avenue for all users?

The City obtained a grant from Caltrans to develop a "Complete Streets" plan for Buchanan Street and San Pablo Avenue. A "Complete Street" aims to incorporate all modes of transportation (pedestrians, bicycles, motor vehicles, etc. in a safe and functional manner).

A series of open studio sessions are planned for December 6-12, starting with the Kick-Off meeting, at 7:00pm Thursday, December 6th (Location TBD) - check our website for details.

Holiday Safety Tips

Fall is in the air! The days are growing shorter and the holidays are approaching. Unfortunately shorter days mean darkness comes sooner and stays longer; and holidays mean people are out and about with expensive purchases or cash in-hand.

The following safety tips can help keep you safe:

- Be aware of your surroundings at all times. If someone or something looks suspicious, report it immediately.
- Always try to park your vehicle in a highly

visible space.

- Lock your vehicle when driving and when parked.
- When walking to your car, have your car keys in your hand and be ready to open the car door immediately.
- Shop during daylight hours. If you must shop after dark, do it with family or friends.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your card is lost, stolen or misused. Thieves will use your stolen credit

- cards within minutes of the theft.
- purchases or other valuables in your car, make sure they are hidden out of sight. Don't give thieves a reason to break into your car.
- Be aware of scams. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is.
- Vacation Watch services are available as a free service form the Albany Police Department.
- Use safety lights when traveling on bike after dark.

Traveling around Town

Safer Routes to School:

The City completed safety improvements to the Marin/Santa Fe intersection including a new traffic signal with protected left turns, more walking space for pedestrians, bike racks at Marin School and solar speed feedback signs on Marin Avenue.

Marin/Buchanan Bikeway: A link between Marin Avenue bike lanes and the Bay Trail is on its way! The City will start construction of a bikeway along Buchanan Street in late 2012.

New Bike Racks:

The City has partnered with merchants and the Albany School District to install bike racks at the Middle School, swimming pool, YMCA, Albany Community Center and Library, and on San Pablo Avenue. The City also

partnered with Albany Strollers & Rollers to install the bicycle-shaped bike racks along Solano and San Pablo Avenues.

Grant funds from several agencies helped us conduct these improvement projects.





Planner's Corner

The City of Albany will begin to update the City's General Plan in 2013. What is a General Plan? The General Plan guides a number of policy and development decisions within the City, and outlines the community's goals for land use, environment, and future growth. Community participation is an essential tool needed to help us create a General

FREE CURBSIDE COLLECTION FOR BATTERIES, CELL PHONES AND CFLS*

*Free to All Customers with Cart Service

Directions for Battery and Cell Phone Collection:

- California prohibits the disposal of batteries in the trash.
- Household batteries (AAA, AA, B, C, D and small button batteries), including rechargeable and cell phone batteries, can be recycled.
- Place batteries in a clear plastic bag, seal shut and place on the top of the gray recyclables cart.
- Place old cell phones in a clear plastic bag, seal shut and place on top of the gray recyclables cart.

Directions for CFL Bulb Collections:

- Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) bulbs do not belong in your trash cart. They contain mercury and are a household hazardous waste.
- Call (510) 613-8710 for your free Vaporlok Foil Bag ("bag").
- Place up to 6 used, unbroken CFLs inside the bag, and keep sealed at all
- Place bag on top of the gray recyclables cart.
- **For broken bulbs, follow the EPA's clean-up instructions: www.epa.gov/mercury/spills.

WHAT TO DO WITH HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Household hazardous waste (HHW) materials such as paints, pesticides, fertilizers, propane tanks and cleaners are not allowed in any of the trash, recycling or organics containers. These HHW materials can be dropped off at participating locations. As a new service, you can recycle batteries, CFL bulbs and cell phones curbside (see reverse for instructions). Visit www.household-hazwaste.org or call (800) 606-6606 for more information.

Materials Accepted

- Paint
- Motor Oil
- Pesticides
- Household Cleaners (including Bleach)
- Fluorescent Tubes
- **Expired Medication**

Who Can Come

Alameda County residents. Please bring proof of residency with you (driver's license, tax bill or utility bill).

How to Package

All materials must be packaged in sturdy, non-leaking, closed containers. No individual container may be greater than 5 gallons or 50 pounds in size. Do not mix different wastes in the same container.

How Much

State law limits the total amount you may transport in one vehicle to 125 pounds or 15 gallons. Wastes must be transported by a resident of the household which generated the waste.
