Anyway, our hike was warm enough, with a little wind and a lot of sunshine, and some very good company.

From the road around the Island, we turn left onto a narrow dirt track with millions of potholes. As the car bounces and progresses, the blue lagoon comes into sight. I want to embrace it all at once....the

beauty, the serene enchantment of this corner of paradise. A few more bumps up and down, a slight curve and here it is—our 'fare': a small house, with a thick thatched roof sitting on the shore, no more than twenty-five meters away from the water with...oh, happi-

ness....a private beach. I am thinking with delight that it will be our home for as long as we want. Not able to wait for the car to come to a complete stop, I open the door, jump out and run towards the lagoon and then, abruptly stopping, flabbergasted, I cry out. the SAND... THE SAND IS BLACK!! Bruna, just behind me, not concerned by the color of the sand, removes her sandals and barefoot rushes across the beach, into the lagoon, splashing water all around her. She is overjoyed, now drenched, giggling exultingly totally out of control.

Jean-Pierre is having fun watching the scene in amazement. He lived and worked in Polynesia for several years, so of course, he knows about the black sand on the east coast and has chosen this unique little house for his new family. Today, the third day of March, is almost our three-week anniversary. Only this morning, Bruna and I, have touched Papeete's ground at Faaa Airport, for the first time. And the thrill continues...

While enjoying the fuss, my newly-wed husband is quietly driving our Citroen into, I should say under, the "garage". It is only a roof of braided coconut tree palm~fronds with four electric poles to keep it standing, if not totally steady.

Our luggage quickly is taken out of the car and we walk to the entry of our Polynesian home. To my surprise we are not given any keys, just because the door has no keyhole or lock. Several panels with hinges attached to one another, then to a wooden frame fold accordion-style (charming nevertheless as we look back). It opens on a small terrace freshly painted in a

soft brick tone in tune with our dark blue lagoon and the light azure of the sky.

Our "mansion" is a little thing, a blue floor living room with a kitchen corner, a bathroom, an alcove

and a master bedroom... with a real

Adjacent to the bedroom is the bathroom composed of an opened shower, just a large square, a half wall separating from the rest of the bathroom, a two bricks high step to stop the water from running out..

Opposite is the sink with the luxury of a mirror and to complete this striking ensemble: the precious accessory a Toilet Bowl with all the trimmings: double top, back reservoir with its own flushing device... we feel like royalty! On the kitchen side of the fare a wall of glass panels or louvers tilt open /close from the top to three feet above the floor allowing lavish light during the day as well as great morning sun rays. Yet, the special attraction is the living room "window", there is no glass but a large opening two feet above the floor, equipped with crossbars. An awning made of a thick fabric with red and white stripes can be rolled up or down to prevent the wind from blowing the rain inside on heavy weather day. From there as the sun shines we distinctly can see the reef in the distance, the huge ocean waves and enjoy the beauty against the sky, listening to the soothing sound of the wavelets on our black sand beach.

About the ceiling, there is no ceiling on the whole fare, nothing at all to insulate its inhabitants. The roof has a slightly truncated pyramidal shape, and viewed from inside it is our very own cathedral!! Later that same week, I realized how the crossbars supporting the roof also allow all sort of small visitors to run from one side of the room to the other...in silence!!! HOWEVER, THIS IS ANOTHER STORY...

Julia Fraser, who attended Albany Senior Center Current Events classes from the late 1980s to the early 2000s, died April 10 in her El Cerrito home. She was 94. Julie's last visit to the center was in June 2011 for the birthday dinner. She was pleased to see her name on the blackboard, and to be recognized when "Happy Birthday" was sung. She was surprised and delighted to win a bingo game and prize at the dinner, having just remarked to a companion that she never won when playing bingo. Julie, a native of Harbin, China, grew up in Lithuania, where she received her undergraduate college degree. She came to the United States near the end of World War II.

She earned a graduate degree in library science and history from the University of Cali-

fornia, Berkeley, and during her professional career worked for the university, the Library of Congress, and Contra Costa County library system. She also organized the St. Jerome Catholic School library in El Cerrito, where she volunteered into her 80s. She was as kind as she was intelligent, outspoken and opinionated.
