Recipe of the Month by Barbara Van Pelt, The Cookbook Lady

Peach Cobbler - Melt 1 cube margarine, pour into 9" x 13" glass pan. Mix together 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 3/4 cup milk, a dash nutmeg and a dash cinnamon and pour over margarine. Spread 4 cups sliced peaches (drained if canned) on top of mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes. Serve warm with whipped or

Bonus Recipe: Cheese Apple Crisp - Arrange 4 cups sliced apples in greased 8" baking dish and sprinkle with 1/4 cup cold water. Mix together 1/3 cup flour, 2/3 cup quick - cooking rolled oats, 1 cup brown sugar, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Cut in 1/3 cup butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Save 1/4 cup of mixture for topping. Stir in 3/4 cup grated cheddar cheese and spread over apples, sprinkle with topping. Bake at 350 degrees until apples are tender, about 25 to 30 minutes.

then on to the park for our picnic lunch. Our bodies and our souls were enriched!!! (Thanks Rebecca







tro. The forested


area--mostly eucalyptus and home to 45 species of birds--was planted by a former mayor of SF, Adolf
