#### ORDINANCE NO. 2020-13

AN URGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALBANY AMENDING URGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 2020-03, AS AMENDED BY URGENCY ORDINANCE NOS. 2020-06 AND 2020-12, TO ALLOW THE RESIDENTIAL EVICTION MORATORIUM TO LAPSE AND TO EXTEND THE TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON EVICTIONS DUE TO NONPAYMENT OF RENT AND RENT INCREASES FOR CERTAIN COMMERCIAL TENANTS DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC AND SETTING FORTH THE FACTS CONSTITUTING SUCH URGENCY

THE ALBANY CITY COUNCIL ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

### **SECTION 1. FINDINGS**

- A. The findings set forth in Ordinance No. 2020-03, No. 2020-06 and No. 2020-12 are still applicable and incorporated herein by reference.
- B. On August 31, 2020, the California Legislature adopted and the Governor signed the Tenant, Homeowner, and Small Landlord Relief and Stabilization Act of 2020 (AB 3088, Chiu), an urgency statute, that, among other things, enacted the COVID-19 Tenant Relief Act of 2020 (Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 1179.01) of Title 3 of Part 3 of the Code of Civil Procedure (CCP)). The COVID-19 Tenant Relief Act of 2020 prohibits residential evictions for a COVID-19 related hardship that accrued between March 1, 2020 to August 31, 2020, and prohibits residential evictions for a COVID-19 related hardship that accrued between September 1, 2020 to January 31, 2021 if the tenant pays at least 25% of the rent due.
- C. The COVID-19 Tenant Relief Act of 2020 applies to residential tenants only (CCP §1179.02(h)); provides that local ordinances adopted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to protect residential tenants from eviction cannot be extended or expanded and shall have no effect during the covered period (CCP §1179.05(a)(1)), and states that local back rent repayment schedules must begin no later than March 1, 2021 (CCP §1179.05(a)(2)). In light of the statewide protections for residential tenants from eviction during the COVID-19 pandemic, the City Council desires to allow its local residential eviction moratorium to lapse as of September 30, 2020 consistent with Ordinance No. 2020-12.

- D. On September 23, 2020, the California Governor issued Executive Order N-80-20 extending the timeframe for the protections in Executive Order N-28-20, Paragraph 2 (previously extended via Executive Order N-66-20 and by Executive Order N-71-20), thereby extending authorization for local governments to limit evictions for commercial tenants impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic through March 31, 2021.
- E. The unemployment rates in Alameda County have increased dramatically due to the COVID-19 pandemic. According to the California Employment Development Department, Alameda and Contra Costa Counties' unemployment rate in August 2020 was 9.8 percent, above the year-ago estimate of 3.2 percent.
- F. The City Council desires to extend the Albany commercial eviction moratorium provisions of Urgency Ordinance Nos. 2020-03, 2020-06 and 2020-12 to prevent widespread unemployment and loss of business during the COVID-19 pandemic, which could increase homelessness, loss of health care among workers, and further the spread of COVID-19.
- E. Public health is served by allowing businesses to follow the public health orders to close or limit operations without fear of imminent eviction.
- F. The City Council desires to maintain economic infrastructure so that all businesses have the ability to recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic outbreak and continue to provide employment and so that economic recovery is possible after the emergency is over, all of which are in the interest of the public peace, health, safety and welfare.
- G. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the City's police powers and powers afforded to the city in the time of a national, state, county and local emergency during an unprecedented health pandemic, such powers being afforded by the State Constitution, State law and Section 2-16 of the Albany Municipal Code to protect the peace, health, and safety of the public. The Albany City Council finds that this Ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety of businesses and workers working within the City and finds urgency to approve this Ordinance immediately based on the facts described herein and detailed

in the staff report. Under Government Code Section 8634, this Ordinance is necessary to provide for the protection of health, life and property.

#### **SECTION 2. DURATION; SUSPENSION**

Section 9 of Ordinance No. 2020-03, as amended by Ordinance Nos. 2020-06 and 2020-12, is amended to read as follows:

"Section 3, Section 6, Section 8 and Section 9 of Ordinance No. 2020-03, as amended, shall remain in effect until March 31, 2021. In order to prevent inconsistencies, the Director of Emergency Services may suspend the effectiveness of any provision in this Ordinance in the event that the President of the United States, Congress, Governor of the State of California or California State Legislature or other body with jurisdiction adopts an order or legislation that similarly prohibits evictions for failure to pay rent by individuals impacted by the COVID-19 crisis."

#### **SECTION 3. EFFECT.**

Except as provided by Section 2 of this Ordinance, all remaining provisions of Ordinance No. 2020-03, as amended by Ordinance Nos. 2020-06 and 2020-12, shall lapse and be of no further force or effect as of September 30, 2020.

## **SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.**

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

# SECTION 5. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW.

The City Council finds that adoption and implementation of this Ordinance is not a "project" for purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), as that term is defined by CEQA guidelines (Guidelines) sections 15061(b)(3), and 15378(b)(5). The effect of the proposed amendment will be to maintain the status quo and extend the existing commercial eviction moratorium for an additional six months consistent with Executive Order N-80-20. No

new development will result from the proposed action. No impact to the physical environment will result. The City Council also alternatively finds that the adoption and implementation of this Ordinance is exempt from the provisions of CEQA as an administrative activity by the City of Albany, in furtherance of its police power, that will not result in any direct or indirect physical change in the environment, per sections 15061(b)(3), and 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines, as well as CEQA Guidelines section 15064(e) (economic regulations).

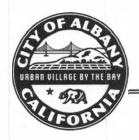

# **SECTION 6. URGENCY DECLARATION; EFFECTIVE DATE.**

The City Council finds and declares that the adoption and implementation of this Ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation and protection of the public peace, health and safety as detailed above and as the City and public would suffer potentially irreversible displacement of commercial tenants and loss of employment resulting from evictions for failure to pay rent during the COVID-19 crisis. During this local emergency, and in the interest of protecting the public health and preventing transmission of COVID-19, it is essential to avoid unnecessary loss of business and jobs which could lead to housed individuals falling into homelessness during a time of abnormal economic conditions, especially given state and county directives to stay at home. Promoting stability amongst commercial tenancies is also conducive to public health by allowing businesses to follow the advice and directives of public health officials to close or limit operations and allowing employees to avoid or limit public contact during times of a public health crisis without fear of imminent eviction or foreclosure. Loss of income as a result of COVID-19 may inhibit City residents and businesses from fulfilling their financial obligations, including payment of rent. The length of the period of federal, state and local emergency is unknown at this time and it is prudent to revisit these emergency response measures as the unprecedented situation and legal landscape evolve. By extending the Local Commercial Eviction Moratorium Ordinance through March 31, 2021 the City Council desires to provide stability for commercial tenants while orders of the Alameda County Public Health Officer continue to mandate significant limitations and closures of businesses and to provide certainty to

landlords on the processes in place to repay deferred rent after the initial period of moratorium. These amendments require immediate action so that commercial eviction protections do not expire. Under Government Code Section 8634 and Section 2-16 of the Albany Municipal Code, this Ordinance is necessary to provide for the protection of life and property for the reasons set out herein. The Council therefore finds and determines that the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and protection of life and property, require that this Ordinance be enacted as an urgency ordinance pursuant to Government Code section 36937 and take effect immediately upon adoption by four-fifths of the City Council. **SECTION 7. CERTIFICATION** The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same, or the summary thereof, to be published or posted in the manner required by law.
