# A statement from the AUSD Asian Pacific Islander Parent Engagement Group founders on the Atlanta mass shootings.

Dear Community,

We are heartbroken by the recent tragedy of the eight lives lost--six of whom are Asian women--horrendously murdered at three Atlanta massage parlors. They deserve justice and to be known in their life and not just in their death. From what has been released, their names are Xiaojie Tan, Delaina Ashley Yaun, Daoyou Feng, Julie Park, and Hyun Jung Kim. They are mothers, a small business owner, a former school teacher, and a new bride on a date with her husband at the time of the incident. You can learn more about their lives here and here.

The shooting in Georgia highlights the deeply overlooked history of hypersexualization and discrimination against Asian and Asian Amerian women, especially as so many Asian immigrant women with limited-English proficiency work in unprotected, low-wage service industries, like nail salons and spas, for survival. They are often targeted for economic exploitation and sexual violence, while they strive to make ends meet or provide for their families. Their hopes, dreams, and struggles are universal to the immigrant experience and are part of the fabric of our collective API stories in this country.

There is no doubt that this news is traumatic for many as we continue to face increased violence and hate in our community across the nation. We encourage everyone to take care of themselves--from reaching out, getting access to resources, and sharing information to supporting the survivors or organizations rooted in the work of serving our most vulnerable community members. We hope the select resources and organizations below offer a starting point for you and your family.

Our presence and work to advocate for our API students in the school district--including educating on our history, celebrating our milestones, and coming together as one collective voice--and build solidarity with other communities are more important than ever.
