RESOLUTION NO. 2022-130

A RESOLUTION OF THE ALBANY CITY COUNCIL APPROPRIATING CITIZENS OPTION FOR PUBLIC SAFETY (COPS) GRANT FUNDS TO ESTABLISH A 2-YEAR MOBILE CRISIS TEAM PILOT PROGRAM AND UTILIZATION OF PRIVATE AMBULANCE SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Albany Police Department has historically been the first responder to calls for assistance related to persons in crisis found to be a danger to themselves or others, or gravely disabled the person is placed on a mental health hold and transported to a psychiatric facility by police; and

WHEREAS, the Albany Police Department had the ability to call Berkeley's Mobile Crisis Team to respond and assist with these calls, in July 2020, Alameda County Behavioral Health took over providing this service but has thus far not met expectations due to limited hours of service and extended response times; and

WHEREAS, in Alameda County, John George Psychiatric Hospital is one of the main locations people placed on a mental health hold can be transported by ambulance only for care, but to adhere to the rules and regulations set forth in the California Health and Safety Code Division 2.5, Sections 1797.52 and 1797.88 Albany Fire Department is unable to transport individuals to John George Psychiatric Hospital because the facility does not have a true emergency department, as well as travel to and from John George extends the time ambulance service is not within the city; and

WHEREAS, Falck of Northern California, the contract provider for County Emergency Medical Services removed the mental health transport requirement from their contract; and

WHEREAS, as an alternative way to better serve the community and lessen the Police Department's direct engagement with persons in crisis or experiencing homelessness staff is

proposing to create a 2-year Mobile Crisis Team Pilot Program and incorporate the use of a private ambulance company to handle these specific transports, should the mobile crisis team not be able to transport the individual and when an individual displays the need for medical treatment, Albany Fire Department would be responsible for transporting the person to a medical facility; and

WHEREAS, Bonita House, Inc (BHI) a local non-profit 501 (c)(3) dual-diagnosis behavioral health agency founded in 1971 located in Alameda County provides a full range of services to adults with co-occurring serious mental health and substance use disorders would be contracted to provide a 2-year Mobile Crisis Team Pilot Program in Albany; and

WHEREAS, the team would comprise a full-time Licensed Behavioral Health Clinician and a Peer Support Specialist, supported by a part-time Data Analyst and a part-time Director of Crisis Services to handle non-violent calls 5 days per week for service to persons of all ages in crisis and or exhibiting symptoms of intoxication, disorientation or delusion and respond to mobile crisis calls through 911 and non-emergency calls as well as provide follow-up sessions to support residents in need; and

WHEREAS, the team would also coordinate with other City Departments, Albany CARES, and Albany Project HOPE to support persons experiencing homelessness in need of mental health support to continue to navigate services and outreach about the new mobile crisis team would include, but not be limited to presentations at school sites and city programs, posting of flyers at City facilities and local businesses/organizations, and posting of information on the City website and eNews; and

WHEREAS, Bonita House, Inc. has extensive experience in providing crisis intervention in a wide range of community settings preventing and managing crises in apartment buildings, houses, street locations, or parks, the Licensed Behavioral Health Clinician and Peer Support Specialist's multimodal and holistic approach to assisting

individuals in crisis will greatly increase individuals' chances of accessing the least restrictive environment needed to recover from their crisis and data collection, analysis, and reporting will be conducted periodically to the City of Albany to determine program efficacy and outcomes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Albany City Council hereby appropriates Citizens Option for Public Safety (COPS) grant funds in the amount of \$650,000 to establish a 2-year Mobile Crisis Team Pilot Program and utilization of private ambulance services to transport persons in crisis who are placed on a mental health hold.
