### **SUMMARY**

The action before the Council is to authorize staff to complete the application and send a letter of commitment to join the AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) Network of Age-Friendly State and Communities. Using the AARP Eight Domains of Livability framework, the City will pursue the active engagement of older adults in a community needs assessment and planning process, and establish and implement an action plan to increase livability, track progress, and evaluate and report on the impact of the work.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

That the Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-72, authorizing staff to complete the application and send a letter of commitment to join the AARP Network of Age-Friendly State and Communities.

### **BACKGROUND**

AARP's Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities is the United States affiliate of the World Health Organization Global Network of Age-Friendly Cities and Communities, an international effort launched in 2006 to help cities prepare for a rapid aging of the population and the parallel trend of urbanization. AARP's participation encourages older adults to take a more active role in their communities and have their voices heard on a variety of initiatives, including housing, caregiving, community engagement, volunteering, social inclusion and combating isolation among older residents.

### **DISCUSSION**

People of all ages benefit from the adoption of policies and programs that make neighborhoods walkable, feature transportation options, enable access to key services, provide opportunities to participate in community activities, and support housing that's affordable and adaptable. A

livable community is one that is safe and secure. It equitably serves residents of all ages, ability levels, incomes, races, ethnicities, and other backgrounds. A livable community enhances the personal independence of its residents, allows them to remain in their homes and communities as they age, and empowers them to engage fully in civic, economic, and social life. A livable community includes public spaces that benefit everyone.

### **ANALYSIS**

As a participant in the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities, the City is committing to creating an age-friendly environment that promotes successful aging and improves the quality of life for all residents. Using the AARP Eight Domains of Livability framework (which emphasizes both built and the social environments), the City will pursue the active engagement of older adults in a community needs assessment and planning process through outreach at the Albany Senior Center to organizations and providers of aging services, churches, and events. The City will establish and implement an action plan to increase livability, track progress, and evaluate and report on impact of the work.

### **SOCIAL EQUITY AND INCLUSIVITY CONSIDERATIONS**

Creating an age-friendly environment promotes successful aging and equitably serves and improves the quality of life of all residents.



### **Enrolling in the Network**

Communities enroll individually or as part of a region. A governor can choose to enroll an entire state. All towns, villages, townships, boroughs, cities, counties and states seeking to enroll in the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities are required to submit a membership application. The community must also provide a letter of commitment signed by the jurisdiction's highest elected official (e.g., a governor, mayor, county executive) or a legislative body can pass and provide a resolution in support of membership.




### **The Program Steps**

Members of the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities commit to an assessment process and cycle of continuous improvement, the steps of which typically require the member community to:

- **1.** Establish a way to include older residents in all stages of the age-friendly process
- **2.** Conduct a community needs assessment (AARP provides survey examples and access to an online tool)
- **3.** Develop an action and evaluation plan based on the assessment results and submit to AARP for review
- 4. Implement the plan and work toward its goals
- **5.** Assess the impact of implementing the plan and submit progress reports
- **6.** Share solutions, successes and best practices across the age-friendly network
- **7.** Repeat!

The **8 Domains of Livability** is the framework used by states and communities enrolled in the network to organize and prioritize their work. The availability and quality of these community features impact the well-being of older adults and people of all ages.
