A Regular Meeting of the Parks And Recreation Commission Minutes Tuesday, April 14, 2009 Albany Senior Center 846 Masonic Ave. 7:00 p.m.

1. Call to Order: 7:07p.m. Commissioners present: Vice Chair Mullarkey, Commissioners Class, Como and Kindle. Excused Chair Pilch (until 8:55pm) Commissioners Linden and Trout.

Staff present: Director Penelope Leach, Planning Manager Jeff Bond, City Engineer Randy Leptien and Robin Mariona.

2. Approval of Minutes: March 12, 2009 Motion:

Motion to approve minutes made by Commissioner Kindle and seconded by Commissioner Como Motion carried 3 in favor and 1 abstention.

- 3. Public Comment: None
- 4. Announcements/Communications: Commissioner Kindle stated that he might have to leave early.
- 5. **Director's Report:** Director Leach stated that high school student Hailey Frail would be doing a community-weeding project. She further stated that Council had approved the purchase of the property at 842 Masonic Avenue next to the Senior Center, and escrow was due to close on April 20th. Plans for the building before demolition were storage, police SWAT training and possible use by BART as office for the retrofit project.

Director Leach stated that community groups were encouraged to participate in the City 4th of July event, as long as they provided an activity that supported the theme.

- 6. Discussion and possible action on matters related to the following items, which could include reports and/or proposed resolutions if any:
 - **6-1.** General Plan Update: Staff will update the Commission on the City's efforts to update the General Plan. Planning Manager Jeff Bond stated that the old plan dates from 1992-2010 were about to expire and formulating the new plan would be a 2-year process. He stated that the General Plan was an important legal document as a foundation for consistency in all of the City's planning, building and engineering projects. Fern Tiger would form the foundation for the General Plan during the waterfront planning process, and the Park and Recreation Master Plan would be a component.
 - **6-2.** Lighting and Landscaping District (LLD): Annually the Commission recommends expenditures/projects for the City's LLD. City Engineer Randy Leptien stated that the assessment revenues were generally used for street lighting, street maintenance, parks, acquisition of open space, creation of playfields, vegetation management, creek restoration, street trees, urban forest and tennis court resurfacing.

He stated that monies from the funds had acquired Albany Hill property; funded play field projects, Cordonices Creek restoration and vegetation management.

Commissioner Class questioned the financial schedules from 2007-2008. Mr. Leptien stated that he would need to check some of the figures and verify what they were used for.

Director Leach recommended vegetation management on Albany Hill for fire prevention and invasive control for a total of \$30,000. She further recommended creating a \$10,000 annual allotment for ongoing management on Albany Hill and strategizing with ShelterBelt.

Public Comment: Doug Donaldson stated support for staff's recommendation for vegetation management on Albany Hill and urged the Commission to adopt it. Albany resident Robert Uhrhammer was in favor of vegetation management and an ongoing program. He stated that street lighting was not full cutoff and installation of full cut off lighting would be much more efficient and asked what had happened to the owl burrows.

Randy Leptien stated that residential lighting was not funded by the assessments, but he would take Mr. Uhrhammer's recommendations back to the Public Works manager. Director Leach stated that she would find out about the owls.

Motion:

Motion to recommend to Council to accept staff recommendations to fund Albany Hill vegetation management for \$30,000 and \$10,000 annually made by Commissioner Kindle and seconded by Commissioner Mullarkey. Motion carried all in favor.

6-3.Accessibility of Albany Parks: Review accessibility of Albany parks to determine if any changes/additions need to be made. Director Leach stated that there had been concerns about ADA accessibility in parks and the staff report addressed possible solutions for the problems and some of the costs.

Commissioner Kindle clarified some of the practical problems and stated that regular maintenance was important for ADA accessibility according to Berkeley standards. He suggested an annual audit to evaluate ADA accessibility compliance, and asked if there were funds available. Vice Chair Mullarkey suggested tabling the issue until next months meeting, for further discussion of annual audits for all parks including Ohlone.

6-4. Terrace Park: Update and recommendations regarding issues brought to the Commission from Terrace Park residents. Director Leach stated that items 6-4 and 6-5 could be discussed together. She stated that Council had not acted on all four of the recommendations that the Commission had made for Terrace Park. Council agreed to remove three of the BBQ stands, but did not act on any of the other recommendations.

Terrace Park residents asked for additions to the signage in the park including a good neighbor message about picking up garbage, no glass in the park, park hours and notification of two City ordinances requiring picking up of dog feces and dogs under the control of a capable person. There was currently no code for enforcement of hours in Albany parks.

Director Leach recommended including language in the municipal code for hours that dogs would not be allowed in parks. She recommended leaving the language vague, which would allow each park including the waterfront to easily be more specific about hours via resolution if necessary, and allow time for evaluation. Funding for doggie bag stations would be partially donated by the Community Foundation.

Commissioner Kindle stated that no dogs in play structure areas, proper voice control as well as dogs not creating a nuisance to other park users should be added.

Public Comment: Terrace Park neighbor, Bill Cooper, stated that people should be able to go into parks without being bothered by dogs and proper control language should be more specific. He further asked that the dog bag stations should be filled frequently.

Commissioner Como stated that the public would monitor the situation, and if the system didn't work, leash laws and specific hours should be discussed.

Motion:

Motion to recommend to Council to approve staff verbage with regard to two ordinances stating requirement for picking up dog feces and dogs under voice control at the parks, with the addition of no dogs in play structure areas, if there was not already an ordinance stating so, made by Commissioner Kindle and seconded by Commissioner Como.

Motion:

Motion to recommend to Council approval of funding for the doggie stations made by Commissioner Class and seconded by Commissioner Kindle. Motion carried all in favor.

Motion:

Motion to create and install signs with language as indicated in the staff report with the addition of garbage in the proper receptacles made by Commissioner Kindle and seconded by Commissioner Como. Motion carried all in favor.

- 6-5. Discussion re Dogs in Parks: The Commission will continue to discuss possible options and alternatives for addressing recent concerns regarding dogs in Albany's parks. Discussed in item 6-4.
- **6-6.** Proposition WW: The Commission will continue to discuss possible uses of Prop WW funds. An update on the proposed projects is due to Council June 2009. Director Leach recommended a joint meeting with the Waterfront Committee on April 27th to attempt to agree on certain projects for WW funds. The recommendations would then be forwarded to Council via a staff report. Vice Chair Mullarkey stated that the Commission needed a selection strategy to determine projects worthy of the money and recommended using the process used by the Waterfront Committee.

Commissioner Class requested the bond language for Measure R. Director Leach stated that she would get that information and the Burrowing Owl staff report.

Director Leach stated that she needed at least one recommendation from each of the Commissioners by end of business on April 21st. Her recommendation for a portion of the money was the creation of a permanent stage at Memorial Park that would cost \$20,000 or less.

Motion:

Motion to join the Waterfront Committee for a joint meeting/planning session on April 27th to discuss projects for WW funds, to further discuss the recommendations from that meeting at the May Commission meeting, and to forward those recommendations on to Council made by Commissioner Kindle and seconded by Commissioner Como. Motion carried all in favor.

Public Comment: Robert Uhrhammer stated that he supported the joint meeting and recommended using WW funds for a Pierce St. Park, as there was great need for a park on that side of Albany. He stated that he would make efforts to contact and set up meetings with CALTRANS to discuss the land.

6-7. Meeting Dates: Discussion of Commissioner conflicts re next months meeting date as well as a possible joint meeting with the Water Front Committee on Monday, April 27, 2009. It was agreed that May 14th meeting date was workable for a quorum of Commission members and that the Commission would meet with the Waterfront on April 27th at 7pm.

6-8. Tree Task Force Update: Update from the TTF

Motion:

Motion to approve Valerie Risk as a Tree Task Force member made by Commissioner Mullarkey and seconded by Commissioner Kindle. Motion carried all in favor.

- **6-9.** Ocean View Sports Field Improvements Update: Staff will give an update on the progress of the project. Director Leach stated that bids were high for the field improvements and there were two alternatives. Project Manager Ana Bernardes could possibly make modifications to the plans to lessen the price. The other alternative was to have Little League build the project for less. Director Leach also proposed creating a community build project, bringing together many community organizations to volunteer and build the project. She stated that she was waiting for more information to determine which alternative would be best.
- **7. Future Agenda Items:** Uses for/demolition of the house on the newly purchased Masonic property, possible update on Ohlone Greenway.

SUBJECT: Buchanan Bicycle and Pedestrian Path-Design Alternatives

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Provide comments to the Traffic and Safety Commission on the design alternatives for the Buchanan Bicycle and Pedestrian Path.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

In 2007 the City obtained a grant in the amount of \$266,000 for the 35% design and environmental work of the Buchanan Bicycle and Pedestrian path project. This path is intended to close the existing gap in the regional and local bicycle network between the Ohlone Greenway and the Bay Trail. As such, this project is ranked No. 1 in the Alameda Countywide Bicycle Plan and therefore, it makes it a prime candidate for funding. The general concept of the design is to extend the bicycle lanes from Cornell Avenue to San Pablo Avenue, explore the possibility of implementing a bike lane in the westbound direction along the north side of Buchanan Street, and build a bicycle and pedestrian path along the south side of Marin Avenue and Buchanan Street from the intersection with San Pablo Avenue to the Buchanan Bridge over crossing. The path along the south side of Marin and Buchanan requires a crossing to the north side of Buchanan Street in order to merge with the bridge over crossing.

The design and environmental work for the project was commissioned to DMJM Harris and its consulting team in February 2008. The City coordinated a kick off meeting between the consultant and institutional stakeholders along the south side of the proposed path in March of 2008. The stakeholders included the University of California, the Albany Unified School District, Ocean View Elementary School, the USDA, and the Albany Strollers and Rollers (AS&R). Originally, the proposed path crossings were Taylor Street and Pierce Street. The AS&R asked the City to include the evaluation of an alternative that would align the path along the northern limit of the USDA property and under the Buchanan over crossing.

The consultant team divided the project in four segments and proposed different alternatives for each segment. The following are the four segments and their alternatives:

Segment I: From Cornell Avenue to San Pablo Avenue:

• Alternative I: Remove 9 trees and conserve parking. Build bulb outs at every intersection on that segment. Replacement of 4 trees planted in the bulb-outs

• Alternative 2: Conserve existing trees and remove existing parking

Segment II: From San Pablo Avenue to the intersection of Buchanan St. and Jackson St.

• One proposal: Align a bicycle path along the south side of Buchanan Street and continue the westbound bicycle lane along the north side of Buchanan St. Install an exclusive right turn lane on Buchanan St. in the eastbound direction. This proposal requires median curb realignment, reduction of traffic flow lanes from 12 feet to 11 feet, and additional right-of-way from the University of California for the construction of the right turn lane.

<u>Segment III:</u> From the intersection of Buchanan Street and Jackson Street to the Ocean <u>View Park entrance driveway.</u> Note: there are 25 parking spaces along the south side of Buchanan St.

- Alternative 1: Remove 3 Redwood trees at Ocean View School yard and 2 Redwood trees at Ocean View Park. Install 7 bulb outs and plant trees on five of them to replace the removed trees. Remove 9 to 10 parking spaces (15-16 parking spaces left)
- Alternative 2: Remove 20 parking spaces and conserve all the trees (five parking spaces left).
- Alternative 3: Remove 15 parking spaces, remove 5 young trees and split the path around the mature Redwood trees along Ocean View Park (10 parking spaces left). Conserve the Redwood trees at Ocean View Elementary School.

Segment IV From Taylor Street to the Buchanan Bridge Over crossing

- Alternative 1: Cross the path to the north side of Buchanan Street at Taylor Street. A traffic signal would be needed at this location for the path crossing; however, it is not warranted by any of the parameters. Remove 11 trees ranging from 9" to 3" trunk diameter. Remove parking along the north side of Buchanan Street from Taylor to Pierce St.
- Alternative 2: Cross the path to the north side of Buchanan St. at Pierce St. Vehicular right-turning volumes at this location warrant the implementation of a traffic signal.

 This alternative proposes the closure of the Buchanan St. spur leading to
 - This alternative proposes the closure of the Buchanan St. spur leading to Cleveland St. to create a safer bicycle and pedestrian connection between the proposed path and the Buchanan Bridge Over Crossing. <u>Note: the Traffic</u>

 Engineer recommends this location as the best crossing alternative for the path.
- Alternative 3: Bring the path along the northern limit of the USDA property and under the Buchanan Over Crossing.


- Alternative 4: Bring path around the Redwood trees and along the east side of the Cleveland spur. This creates a 14% slope path from the Buchanan spur/Cleveland intersection under the bridge and the bridge access.
- Alternative 5: Bring path around the Redwood trees and along the west side of the Cleveland spur. This yields a 22% slope for the path from the Buchanan spur/Cleveland intersection to the bridge access.







SUBJECT: Accessibility in Albany's Parks

RECOMMENDATION

Information only.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of this staff report is to give the Commission an idea of the current accessibility concerns at Albany parks that staff is aware of to date. This staff report is not an attempt to address all of the issues community members may wish to discuss with the Commission, as staff may not be aware of all of their concerns. Two concerns of which staff is aware pertain to Ocean View Park regarding the use and maintenance of the fibar surface in the playground area and the two Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) garden beds located in the community garden.

The concern regarding the use of fibar in the play area at Ocean View Park and whether or not it is ADA compliant was raised to City staff in October 2007. Staff asked the park design architect for information regarding fibar's ADA compliance. The architect's response was as follows:

"Fibar is a widely used, less expensive alternative to poured-in-place (rubberized) surfacing. They both accomplish the same thing - they provide wheel chair access to play features and also act as a safety cushion from the tallest "fall-height" of the specified equipment. It is a ASTM (American Society of Testing Materials) approved product. This product is also endorsed by ADAAG (American with Disabilities Accessibility Guidelines) and IPEMA (International Playground Equipment Manufacturer's Association). It is deemed wheelchair accessible by [all] organization[s] that have any influence or involvement in playground design and accessibility."

The question lately appears to be the unevenness of the fibar surface and how often it is groomed to maintain a level surface. There are a few issues staff is having regarding the fibar surface. For instance, additional fibar needs to be added in the areas that are prone to more wear and tear and to keep the level flush with the sidewalk. Typically fibar is only delivered in very large quantities. Finding a place to store the material until it is

needed is one issue. Staff is working with the fibar distributor to see if the City can have smaller loads delivered, possibly in bags. Another issue is how often staff should and is able to maintain the area. There are non-specific intervals stated in the Fibar maintenance instructions that would require two full days to dig in and turn over the Fibar to fluff it up. It is also an intense type labor that calls for machine assistance. Staff is also looking into this with the Fibar distributor.

An alternative to the fibar surface is a rubberized surface like that used at the main play area at Memorial Park. During the recent renovations when Ocean View Park was in its design phase, the rubberized surface was considered, but was cost prohibitive. Staff met with a representative from Tot Turf, a primary distributor of rubberized playground surfaces, in March 2009 to discuss the cost of covering the play area at Ocean View Park with the rubberized surface. The cost to cover the entire play area at Ocean View Park is estimated to be \$62,222. This estimate does not include the removal and disposal of the existing fibar, which would add approximately \$25,000 to the estimate, for a total estimate of \$87,222. A second alternative would be to cover only a portion of the play area and use a combination of fibar and rubberized surface. The area under and around the ADA swing as well as the area under and around the play structure could be covered for an estimated cost of \$30,868. The cost of removing and disposing of the existing fibar for this portion of the total area would be an additional \$13,500, for a total estimate of \$44,368. Please see the attached estimates and a sketch of the play area showing the partial rubberized surface alternative. The square footage of the rubberized surface for the second alternative could be diminished to further bring down the cost.

Regarding the ADA garden beds at Ocean View, staff does not have a clear understanding of the concerns at the this time, but is open to hearing from the public their concerns and any solutions they may have.

SUSTAINABILTY IMPACT

Tot Turf uses recycled California tires in their product and the product does not have to be replaced due to wear and tear. Instead, Tot Turf resurfaces playgrounds at a slightly lesser cost than the original installation so there is no need to dispose of the surface. The rubberized surface lasts between 5 to 8 years before having to be resurfaced depending on the level of use and the exposure to heat and sunlight.

FISCAL IMPACT

Estimated cost of:

Rubberized Surface covering the entire playground site \$87,222 Rubberized Surface covering a portion of the site: \$44,368

With the rubberized surface, there would be an initial cost savings as the City would not have to maintain and refill the fibar; however, the rubberized surface has to be resurfaced every 5 to 8 years at a cost that is between 65%-75% of the original cost. For example, if

the original cost to cover the entire surface was \$62,222, the replacement cost would be approximately \$40,444 -\$46,666. Similarly, if the original cost to cover a portion of the area was \$30,868, the cost for resurfacing would be approximately \$20,064 - \$23,151.

If the Commission recommends a rubberized surface, the Commission would need to add this project to the projects for consideration of Measure WW funds, as there are no other funds available at this time.



SUBJECT: East Bay Regional Park District Proposition WW

RECOMMENDATION

Discuss possible uses for Proposition WW funds.

BACKGROUND

East Bay Regional Parks District Measure WW, which passed in November 2008, is an extension of Measure AA passed by East Bay voters 20 years ago. Measure AA helped preserve 34,000 acres of open space, developed over 100 miles of new trails, and funded hundreds of local parks and recreation projects. While much has been accomplished, the growing East Bay population further increases the need for acquiring new parklands, protecting and restoring natural habitat, and helping communities with their local park and recreation facilities. Measure WW will be used to continue to restore urban creeks; protect wildlife; purchase and save open space, wetlands, and bay shoreline; and acquire, develop, and improve local and regional parks, trails, and recreational facilities close to home for East Bay residents.

The measure allocates funds to cities based on population. The City of Albany will be allocated \$771,363, and has up to the year 2018 to use the funds. Cities are able to submit projects to East Bay Regional Park District in February and March of each year. This allows East Bay Regional Park District the ability to sell enough bonds, on an as-needed basis, to pay for the submitted eligible projects.

At the February 2, 2009 Council meeting, the City Council voted to refer to the Parks & Recreation Commission for discussion, deliberation and recommendation regarding the use of the City of Albany's per capita portion of Measure WW funds, and to also refer to the Waterfront Committee for its recommendation. The Waterfront Committee is to forward to the Parks & Recreation Commission their recommendations by June 2009, when the Commission will present all recommendations to the Council.

DISCUSSION

Staff has attended two workshops regarding Proposition WW funds. The purpose of the workshops is to make clear the procedures and guidelines for eligible projects as well as the various documents necessary for reimbursement for projects. In order for a project to be considered, staff must submit an application form, cost estimates, CEQA certification

forms, evidence of ownership or lease and site control of the property, project location map, site plan, photographs, required permits, etc. Cities are required to pay for the project upfront. Cities may be reimbursed throughout the project with 20% of the total cost of the project being retained until the project is complete and signed off by EBRPD.

Since Measure WW passed in November 2008, several projects have been mentioned for use of the funds. Also, in the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Master Plan completed in 2004, there are project recommendations that have not been developed. Please visit the City's website, www.albanyca.org, to see the full text of the Recommendations Section of the Master Plan. Click on the Parks and Recreation Commission agenda for April 14, 2009 to see the recommendations section. Attached is a brief summary of the recommended projects from the 2004 Master Plan.

Based on discussions from previous meetings with the Commission and community members, below is a list, in no particular order, of items that have been mentioned to date:

- 1. Add to the funding for the purchase of Pierce Street Park. The land is currently owned by Caltrans. More information regarding Pierce Street Park will be discussed at the May 14, 2009 Commission meeting.
- 2. Ohlone Greenway improvements
- 3. Developing the practice field at Memorial Park into a full-sized softball field.
- 4. Senior Center Expansion.
- 5. Permanent stage at Memorial Park for the City's special events.
- **6.** Purchase and renovation of the Veteran's Memorial Building.
